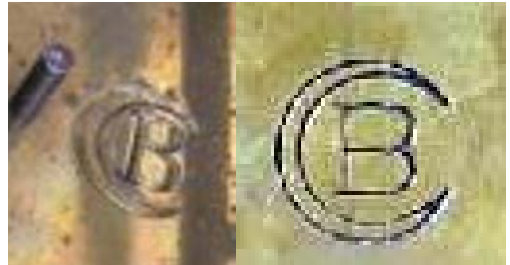

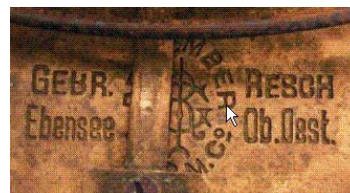

Meiji Clock Company

Nagoya, Japan

MEIJI was located in Nagoya, Japan beginning around 1895. In addition to Seikosha, the Meiji (pronounced like MY GEE) Clock Company affiliated with the ANSONIA CLOCK COMPANY in New York to produce Ansonia type movements for their oriental clocks. Later, the Meiji Clock Company produced clocks and movements of the Ansonia style.

Anton Winterhalder married the daughter of Johan Hofmeier and established a factory in Neustadt 1895. Four of Antons sons followed their father each having his own factory with Linus Winterhalder co-ordinating. Trademark also text "W. & H. Sch" (sometimes in a square).



Em. Wehrle & Comp.

Schonenbach, Furtwangen, Germany

(Emilian) Trompeteruhrenfabrikation,

Emilian Wehrle (1832-1896) made musical clocks in the Furtwangen-Schonenbach area from about 1857 until his death in 1896. These musical clocks included the Trumpeter clock, Flute clock, Singing Bird Clock, and Rooster Clock.

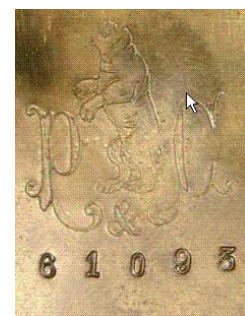
Schlencker-Grusen Uhrenfabrik

Villingen, Baden, Schwarzwald, Germany

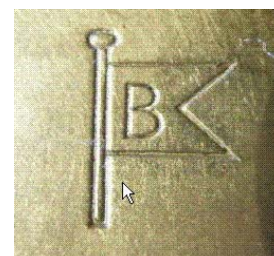
Also "Regulator-fabrik" and Werner-Werke"

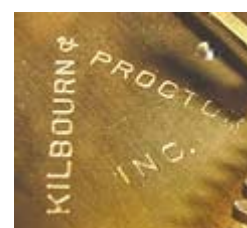
